This side event aims to illustrate how Indigenous Knowledges (IK) are transmitted, their contributions to a sustainable development, and their mobilization for the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals, the International Decade on Indigenous Languages 2022-2032, and ultimately the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

Description:

















Indigenous languages are a vehicle for the intergenerational transmission of the IK. As part of the International Decade of Indigenous Languages 2022-2032, we must examine opportunities to promote, preserve and revitalize these languages.

This event brings together diverse stakeholders: Indigenous Peoples' organizations, Indigenous knowledge holders, Youth, Member States, United Nations agencies, funds and programs, academic institutions, donors and allies to share the opportunities that Indigenous Knowledges represent for the implementation of the 2030 Agenda.

We expect it to be a space to build and strengthen partnerships for synergies to advance on different ongoing processes: 2030 Agenda, International Decade of Indigenous Languages 2032-2032, Enhanced Participation of Indigenous Peoples in the United Nations, UNDRIP. Indigenous Peoples contributions could be better valued and mobilized through innovative frameworks.
